A t Eau Claire Energy Cooperative, we take pride in providing you —

our member-owners — with safe, reliable, and affordable power. But delivering on that promise is becoming more complex as energy policy decisions in Washington, D.C., and Madison increasingly impact how electricity is generated, transmitted, and delivered.

The demand for electricity is skyrocketing, driven by growing populations, expanding industries, and new technologies like data centers, electric vehicles, and AI-powered systems. According to recent projections from the North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC), peak power demand is expected to grow by more than 18% over the next decade. At the same time, some federal regulations are pushing reliable generation resources — like natural gas and coal — offline at a pace that is faster than they can be replaced with dependable alternatives.

Recent actions by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to revisit and reconsider some of these rules signal a positive step toward protecting grid reliability. At ECEC, we welcome common-sense energy policy that supports environmental goals and ensures power remains affordable and available when our members need it most.

We believe smart policy should support practical solutions — like maintaining reliable baseload generation, modernizing our grid, and investing in technologies that enhance reliability and efficiency.

Policy advocacy isn't just something that happens in Washington — it starts right here, with you. As a member-owner of Eau Claire Energy Cooperative, your voice carries real weight. Whether you're voting in local, state, or national elections, contacting your legislators, or simply learning more about the issues, your involvement helps shape a stronger energy future for our community.

And you're not alone in that effort. The board of directors and leadership team at Eau Claire Energy Cooperative meet regularly with local, state, and federal legislators to educate them on cooperative priorities and advocate for policies that support reliable, affordable electricity for our members. Biannually, we host a local Candidates Energy Forum to engage directly with those running for office on the energy issues that matter to our members. We also participate in WECA's Lobby Days at the state Capitol and attend the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's (NRECA) Legislative Conference in Washington, D.C., ensuring your voice is heard at every level of government.

These efforts help make sure rural perspectives are represented when energy policy decisions are being made.

That's why Eau Claire Energy Cooperative supports Voices for Cooperative Power — a grassroots platform created to educate and empower cooperative members like you. Then the dog days of summer hit — those hot, sticky weeks when even the family dog seeks shade — it's a good time to think about how you use electricity. Between rising outdoor temps and increased indoor cooling, summer can take a bite out of your energy budget. But with a few smart adjustments, you can stay cool and save money — without giving up comfort.

Just like we look after our pets, it's important to look after our homes during extreme heat. That means using energy wisely, especially during peak demand times. Here's how to do just that — with a little inspiration from ECEC employees' furry friends.

Keep Cool Air Where It Belongs

Your HVAC system works hard during the summer. Help it perform better — and waste less energy by:

- Changing your air filter every month. A clean filter means better airflow and less work for your system.
- Clearing the area around your outdoor A/C unit. Trim bushes and remove debris within two feet of the unit for optimal airflow.
- Sealing air leaks. Check around windows, doors, and baseboards for cracks or gaps. Weather stripping and caulk are inexpensive fixes that can keep cool air in and hot air out.

Program Like a Pro

If your thermostat is still set manually, it might be time for an upgrade.

- Install a programmable or smart thermostat to automatically adjust temperatures when you're away or asleep.
- Set it a few degrees higher when no one is home (or just the dog is!), and use fans to stay comfortable.
- Remember: ceiling fans cool people, not rooms. Turn them off when you leave a room.

Afternoons can be tough on both pets and power grids. From 2 p.m. to 7 p.m., energy use is at its highest, and the grid is working overtime.

Here's how to be a cool co-op member:

- Delay energy-heavy chores. Run dishwashers, washing machines, and dryers early in the morning or late at night.
- Avoid heating up your kitchen. Grill outdoors or prep nocook meals like sandwiches and salads.
- Keep curtains closed during the day to block out sunlight and reduce indoor temperatures naturally.

Create a Cool Zone for You and Your Dog

Your pup probably has a favorite cool corner of the house — and you should, too. Try these tips to make your home a summer haven:

- Stick to the lowest level of your home heat rises, so basements and ground floors are naturally cooler.
- Dress for the weather. Lightweight, breathable clothes mean you can set the thermostat a little higher and still be comfortable.
- Unplug devices you're not using. Chargers, printers, and electronics still draw power when plugged in.
